

## White House Denies that Clapper Is Overseeing NSA Review; He's Just in Charge of It

Obama and the White House just can't help themselves. On Tuesday, according to *The Hill*, they denied media accounts that Director of National Intelligence James Clapper will oversee the government's review of its surveillance programs, which Obama announced on Aug. 9 with much fanfare. "Director Clapper will not be a part of the group, and is not leading or directing the group's efforts," said Caitlin Hayden, a White House spokeswoman, who added that the White House will select members of the group.

However, despite these denials, the fact remains that Obama sent a memo to Clapper on Monday, which directed him to "establish" the review group, and states that the group will brief Obama on its interim findings "through" the DNI, and will "provide a final report and recommendations through the DNI."

Meanwhile, another one of Obama's latest lame-duck "snit fits" is over the fact that Senate Democrats dared to express their support for Janet Yellen to

become Fed chairman, and that many have spoken out on their strong opposition to Larry Summers. The Wall Street Journal reports that White House officials are "surprised and irritated" at Senate Democrats over the issue, and they are moving "behind the scenes to quash the campaign and are insisting President Barack Obama not be pressured as he mulls whom to nominate."
